HOW TO USE THIS BOOK

Grimy streets pave the way into the underbelly of the city. The hearts of the people are as hard as the cobblestones they live and die upon.

The men in cheap suits a decade out of fashion loitering out front of the pool hall aren't just loitering. They are waiting. Waiting for their mark. The person with the scoop on the stolen painting their boss wants found.

The Book of Random Tables: Noir gives game masters tools to help craft and prepare hard-broiled detective campaigns in the vein of *The Maltese Falcon*, *Double Indemnity*, and *The Third Man*. The tables could also be used in dieselpunk or pulp adventures as well.

The main 32 tables are d100 and can be used in a variety of ways. Game masters can roll on them or choose from them during session prep. However, the exciting way to use them is during role-playing game sessions which allows the dice to tell the story.

The book is broken down into sections. The first one is Items & Things. The tables are Items in a Dime Store, Items in a Bus Station Locker, Items on a Dead Body, and Fictional Dime Store Novel Titles. Plus as a bonus, ten MacGuffins that can be used to build entire campaigns around.

The next section is NPCs or non-player characters. The tables here are Private Eye Clients, Crime Bosses, and Private Eyes. These were created because many detective stories begin with a client walking into the private eye's office, and usually, a crime boss comes into the story at some point.

Case Ideas is a section with only one table. Cases are the lifeblood of detective stories. Here are 100 seed ideas to help game masters launch into campaigns.

Places is a simple section that provides names where meetings or crimes can happen. The tables are Hotels & Bars in Los Angeles (real and fictional) and Los Angeles Neighborhoods.

The Names section comes next. There are Female Names, Male Names, and Surnames fitting the period. Harold, Otis, Gloria, and Harriet fit with the era better than Liam, Dylan, Aspen, or Brittany.

The last three sections: the 1940s, the 1950s, and People give books, songs, movies, and more so that game masters can create an air of realness to their campaigns.

Whatever seedy adventure awaits or whatever tangled caper needs to be unraveled, these random tables will help. Just don't stand in a backlit doorway or let your guard down when the pretty lady asks for help.

MACGUFFINS

1. **The Clockwork Nightingale** | An intricately crafted brass nightingale that sang and moved its body in a simple but lifelike fashion. It was made as a gift for the king of Denmark supposedly in the early 14th century. Stories were told about it. However, by the late 1600s, it had disappeared. Recent rumors say it was spotted in Nazi-looted treasures and has made its way to New York or Argentina.
2. **The Hofstadter Ming Vase** | So called after a 1700s German historian and traveler who believed the vase carried a map to a hidden emperor's tomb filled with treasure. Supposedly, a Qing Dynasty official seized the vase as Hofstadter attempted to smuggle it out of the country only to be stolen from the official by bandits. Rumors say it showed up in Marrakesh 10 years ago and was bought by an English lord for a pittance.
3. **The Goryeo Celadon Ewer** | Delicate cranes and clouds float on a background sky of soft blue-green. It passed through the hands of several archaeologists and at least one European noble family before it was said lost on the Titanic. Rumor now says it is held in the private collection of a Hollywood mogul.
4. **The Florentine Diamond** | The massive stone fabled throughout Europe and once having belonged to the Medici family and Marie Antoinette was stolen from the Hungarian crown jewels during The Great War. The fate of the stone is uncertain but many would do anything to get their hands on it.
5. **Golden Cypriot Diadem** | The solid gold diadem is said to have been recovered from a grave site dating to the 4th century BC in 1847, this diadem has become highly sought after by collectors and museums alike. However, it disappeared in Hong Kong when it was supposed to be shipped to the British Museum.
6. **"The Case"** | A locked alligator skin briefcase said to be stolen from the Los Alamos laboratory. Now, it is sought after by US agents, foreign operatives, and spies around the globe. It is last believed to be in San Francisco.
7. **"The Envelope"** | A sealed manila envelope believed to contain the identities of American spies was stolen from a safe house in Antwerp. The trail has led across the globe and even possibly back to America.
8. **The Child Ruler** | A mummified child taken from an ancient Egyptian tomb. A solid gold ankh is believed to be wrapped with the remains. The mummy was supposedly smuggled out of Egypt in the 1880s in a woman's travel trunk. It is believed to have changed hands numerous times until all trace was lost in Berlin at the end of the Great War.
9. **"The Microfilm"** | A sealed roll of undeveloped microfilm said to contain the photographs of a secret British plane design. It was procured by a spy who then fled the country, sparking a global hunt.
10. **The Persian Albarello** | An ornately decorated lidded jar said to be filled with ancient ambergris. Supposedly it was presented as a gift to Tamerlane while he was conquering Persia. The vessel appeared in stories, rumors, and legends for many years until it was regarded as a fable. However, in 1927 an art dealer in Cairo claimed to possess it. It was promptly stolen and the dealer murdered.

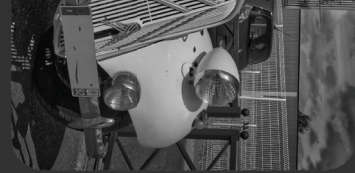

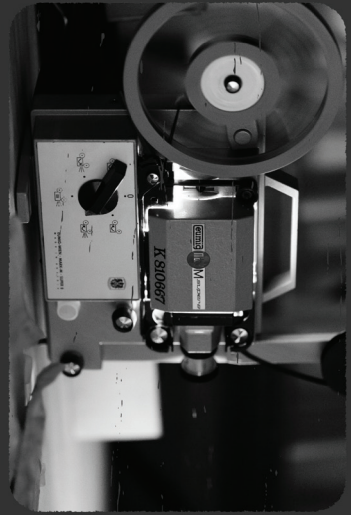

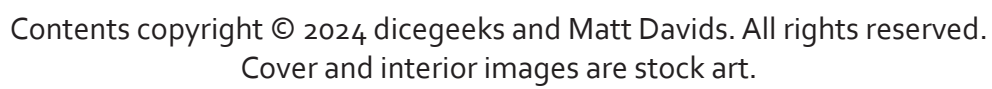
